With a rising lack of community trust in the election process, and much of that lack of trust being pointed at technology's role in our election system, counties around the country have been deciding to end the use of dominion voting machines. Among the latest to do so is Shasta County in California. The Board of Supervisors in Shasta County recognized that despite the loss of money spent on contracts to have the machines, the machines had to be kicked to the curb



because continuing to use the machines was destroying the public's trust in elections. While the government claims the machines go through stringent and rigorous testing before being allowed into polling places, the public is telling their representatives that the government is a part of the problem. Who do you trust more, and seek to serve more? Central government, or the people who voted you into office?

In Riverside County, in order to convince the County Sheriff to get involved in the process of building a body of evidence revealing that our own county needs to say "goodbye" to the machines, Shelby Bunch undertook a petition campaign that has not only been effective, but has led to action from the Sheriff's Department. Yvette Anthony, an ally of Shelby's, has also been on top of the issue through records requests and time spent at the Registrar of Voters. Both of these ladies will be presenting their findings, and how they got the Riverside County Sheriff to investigate Dominion Machines when they visit the Constitution Association as this month's speakers.
